Over the last couple of months, we have been reading about Jesus' early ministry and the reaction from the people and leadership of Israel. Even his own family had trouble understanding the changes that they had seen in Jesus in this short period of time. How could he leave an established trade as a carpenter to embark on such a risky journey with a group of followers who were not considered to be the "best of the best."

His chosen group consisted of some fishermen, a tax collector who had turned his back on his own

people by profiting from collecting taxes for the despised Roman occupiers, and a zealot nationalist who swore to end the occupation of the Romans even if it meant by force and assassinations. To many, it seemed as though Jesus had completely lost his mind. We see this in Mark 3:20-21, "Then Jesus entered a house, and again a crowd gathered, so that he and his disciples were not even able to eat." When his family heard about this, they went to take charge of him, for they said, "He is out of his mind."

Jesus' message was so radical that his teachings and behavior were now being closely watched by the Scribes and Pharisees. They didn't trust anyone who was able to reach the people in the way Jesus was able to reach them. He defied those that were in positions of power when he said, "I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and intelligent and have revealed them to infants." It is surprising that the eyes and ears of these Iewish religious leaders were closed and did not recognize this ancient Semitic idiom, which meant that all humans, not just the religious or worldly elite, can know about God. The reference in this idiom to infants referred to the ability of new believers to understand his message. The whole focus of his ministry was to reach all people,

including those who were marginalized, poor, and uneducated. This can be seen by the followers he chose.


Because of his preaching and appeal he had with the people, the "wise and intelligent" Scribes and Pharisees were determined to silence his message. He represented to them a challenge to their authority and their power base. He put them at risk of the wrath of the Roman occupiers. In their minds, he was instigating an insurrection that would put their comfortable lifestyles at

risk. He defied them by proclaiming that, "All things have been handed over to him by the Father." This was a strong affirmation of Jesus' self-understanding and sense of unique authority as the Son of Man – the living God. Jesus understood all too well how his message would be taken and the ultimate consequences. We find this in Luke 12:51-53, "Do you think I have come to bring peace on earth? No, I tell you, but rather division! From now on five in one household will be divided, three against

two and two against three."

We hear Jesus calling out to them even now, "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest." He is saying, I myself will lead you into rest. "Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Here with Jesus, we see his emphasis was on a personal relationship and not on doctrine or During Jesus' time, the Jewish rituals became such a burden that it had separated humankind from God, rather than bringing them to Him. Judaism had become a barrier instead of a bridge! Jesus eliminated all the barriers to God. By his breaking of the Jewish rules and ritual, he put himself willingly on the path to the cross.

This rejection of the Lordship of Jesus and the

inauguration of the Kingdom of God has continued for over two thousand years from the first century Palestine to our modern-day world of the 21<sup>st</sup> century. We need to ask why we can't break this cycle of rejection of what is good – of what brings us closer to the holiness of our heavenly Father. How can we break this cycle? How can we eliminate this brokenness in our lives?

One way is to follow the great commandment found in Matthew, 22:36-40, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and all your soul and all your mind and love your neighbor as yourself." Only when we can do this, can we begin to respect the difference of others in our lives. We can no longer judge those that have different different customs. ideas. or come somewhere else. We need to embrace this commandment and incorporate it into our daily lives. It is not acceptable to practice this great commandment only on Sunday for one hour as it must be internalized in on our being. It must become second nature for us.

Another way to begin is to not worry about what others may think of us. I am sure that most of you would say that you are not subject to peer pressure. Peer pressure is something that our children must endure. However, we all care to a certain extent whether we choose to admit it or not. We care about our appearance; we care about what our neighbors think of us and our importance in our communities. I believe that we should only care about what God thinks of us. We can hide who we are from our neighbors. However, we cannot hide from the scrutiny of our Lord. If we are right with God, we will in turn be right with our neighbors. This is true because being right with our heavenly Father means that we need to be obedient to Him and, of course, that means following his precepts and commandments as revealed to us in Jesus' radical message. Amen.

### FROM YOUR LAY LEADER

This past May I had the privilege along with our lay delegates, Tony and Dianna Basile, and Pastor Bob, to attend the 240th Session of the Baltimore Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church. This year's theme was: "Like Fire Shut Up in Our Bones," from Jeremiah 20:9. There were approximately 571 churches from across Maryland, Washington D.C., and the panhandle of West Virginia, and their representatives who gathered at the conference.

The conference opened with a selection of workshops at 10 a.m. on Wednesday morning. Dianna and Tony attended a workshop called "BLESS." It showed ways to love your neighbor and change the world! BLESS is an acronym for "Begin with Prayer, Listen, Eat Together, Serve in Love, and Share Your Story!" Pastor Bob and I walked to our workshop, "Rooted in Faith: A Mini Pilgrimage Experience," as we went just around the corner to the Old Otterbein UMC, the Mother Church of the United Brethren in Christ. Rev. Bonnie McCubbin gave us a breathtaking tour of gardens, the old sanctuary, and the magnificent organ and bell tower at this location. There is a very vibrant active, and diverse group of parishioners who gather each Sunday to worship and experience fellowship. Pastor Bonnie wears many hats as well, as she is the Director of Museums and Pilgrimage/Conference Archivist for the BWC.

In our laity session on Wednesday afternoon, we heard Rev. Michael Beck speak about re-imagining church. Rev. Beck is the director of the denomination's Fresh Expression Initiative.

He pastors three churches in Florida, two of which are traditional. The third one is quite innovative with 13 fresh expressions "churches" that meet in unorthodox locations. His church ministers to those that need an addiction recovery program, a food program, and an interracial unity movement. They have meetings in tattoo parlors, in yoga studios, in a Tesla grouping, among may other locations. They have a successful dinner church, called "Family Table," with a Jesus story and they eat, play, and pray together. Their Open Arms Village is used to generate revenue as it houses men who need a place in which to live. Another program is called "Burritos and Bibles," and the list goes on. It is living in church wherever we are. This innovative idea gives one pause to consider how church will be re-invented in the next fifty years.

Opening worship with Bishop La Trelle Easterling preaching was quite stimulating. The theme of worship was built around Romans 12:1-9. Churches can be anywhere and at any time. For example, Susanna Wesley once held church in her kitchen. Church is not a building, but a dialogue amongst people who want to learn more about Jesus. Indeed, we need to share Jesus outside of the church in all types of spaces and situations. The theme of "Like a Fire Shut Up in Our Bones," encouraged us to go out into the world and spread the Gospel. Let's change our lives and transform the world!

### FROM YOUR LAY LEADER CONTINUED

The Plenary Sessions are where the business of the conference takes place. Lay delegates as well as clergy vote in those sessions. Mt. Nebo's voting member is Dianna Basile. The four resolutions centered around reproductive freedom. recognition of sickle cell anemia in our communities, celebrating the 40th anniversary of reconciling ministries network. and establishing a camping Sunday in February.

Another plenary session focused on restructuring the conferencing by creating six districts into hubs as opposed to the eight-district model we now have. Five to twelve local churches will be grouped in a collaborative hub in a shared, geographically based, mission field. This with re-structuring will not be operational until July 2025.

In a third plenary session the budget for the BWC was presented. There are changes in the clergy pension plan, the base salary and housing allowance were considered. The good news is that the benevolence factor for the Mission Shares (Apportionment) will be reduced to 17.4%.

During the last plenary session, 6 persons were commissioned to be provisional elders, and 13 were commissioned as elders. There were 32 retirees this year as well.

The various exhibits were informative about many of the BWC Ministries. It was interesting to meet many of the leaders of various conference positions and other members of churches across our denomination.

Our Youth can look forward to a newly imagined Youth Conference in 2025. This will take place March 7-9 at Ocean City Convention center and is entitled, "Ignite."

Bible Study on Romans with Dr. Carla Works was the perfect way to end my time at Annual Conference. Her insights into the scriptures were insightful as well thought provoking. Dr. Works is the Dean of Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington D.C. and her research on the scriptures is stellar.

### **VOLUNTEERS IN MISSION**

The team heard information regarding four different locations, two in North Carolina, one in Kentucky, and one in Tennessee.

The two in NC, Plymouth, and Beaufort, are from hurricanes and floods several years ago. There are people living in mold infested homes. These homes do not have basements, so when the floods came, the insulation was soaked, and the floor joist and floors never dried out. The floors are soft and sagging and slowly rotting away. There have been several incidents with dishonest contractors, so the people are having trust issues with anyone they don't know. Many of these homes have been in the same family for generations.

The other two locations, Hindman, KY and near Johnson City, TN are in Appalachia. In 2022, they experienced a massive flood and another one within the same week. Both locations are rehabbing existing homes and also new homes. Many of the buildings and downtown were completely whipped out and both areas are struggling to get back to normal.

So where do we go to serve? Those who have been struggling for years to find a way to live safely in their homes or help those who have lost their homes and possessions altogether?? This is the question the VIM team is praying about and we would appreciate your prayers too. Please pray for guidance as to where to serve and that all the


