As we move into November, I want to carry forward on the theme of those things that we don't often discuss that keep us from fully developing in our Christian faith - willfulness, ambition, and the need for power.

In October, a great amount of time was spent on our willfulness and our ambition to satisfy our selfish needs - putting ourselves first and ignoring the needs of others. We continue this journey by adding the need for power and honor.

Example of power-hungry leaders abound in scripture, in both the Old and New Testaments. Almost like an old western movie, we see the power-hungry leaders selfishly abusing their powers to gain their objectives at any cost - most of the time at the expense of innocent people in their path.

We see the "good guys" as the leaders that are selfless, giving all that they can, promoting fairness and justice. However, when we see power-seeking behavior occurring in the inner circle of Jesus' followers, we see the "good guys" behaving like "bad guys," it creates a dissonance in our minds. Maybe that's a good learning opportunity for all of us. It demonstrates clearly that no matter how close to God we are, we must be intentional in our desire to clear our minds of thoughts and actions that will lead us from our beloved creator. This can be seen in the disciple's behavior in Mark 10:35-40: *James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to him and said to him, "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." And he said to them, "What is it you want me to do for you?" And they said to him, "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory." But Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I*

*drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?" They replied, "We are able." Then Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared."*

In this scripture reading, we see James and John looking to be Jesus' chief ministers of state. Maybe this behavior was kindled because on more than one occasion Jesus had made them part of his inner circle. Maybe they were a little better off than the others and believed that they deserved



more recognition. In any event, they showed themselves as men in whose hearts was the need for power and control in an earthly kingdom.

It tells us that they completely failed to understand Jesus and his message. The amazing thing is not the fact that this incident happened, but the time at which it happened. After, Jesus shared with them his fate - his ultimate sacrifice on the cross. Words were powerless to rid them of the idea of a Messiah of earthly powers and glory. Only the cross could do that.

The actions of James and John aroused deep resentment among the other ten. Immediately the old controversy about who was to be greatest began to rage again. However, Jesus takes immediate action. He calls them to him and makes it quite clear the different standards of greatness in his kingdom and in the kingdoms of the world. In the kingdom of the world, the standard of greatness is power. In the kingdom of Jesus, the standard is that of service. Greatness consisted not in reducing others to one's service, but in reducing oneself to their service.

Two thousand years later, the hearts of men

and women have not changed much. Henri Nouwen, the great author and pastor, observed that we live in a society that is obsessed with competition and success. From the moment we begin to interact with others, we are trying to become winners, since losers get left behind - "Our parents, teachers, and friends impress upon us from the moment we are able to pick up the cues that it is our holy task to make it in this world. To be a real man or woman is to show that one cannot only survive the long competitive struggle for success but to also come out victorious."

The Christian Scriptures base salvation not on upward mobility but on the freedom that comes from downward mobility: "The divine way is indeed the downward way." God took flesh in the carpenter from Nazareth, and he never once adhered to the model of popularity, success, or power. Nouwen calls us to walk the selfless way of Christ and to serve others in humility. Here are words that are very authentic, and one can almost hear the author turn them toward himself: "Our true challenge is to return to the center, to the heart, and to find there the gentle voice that speaks to us and affirms us in a way no human voice ever could. The basis of all ministry is the experience of God's unlimited acceptance of us as beloved children, an acceptance so full, so total, and all-embracing, that it sets us free from our compulsion to be seen, praised, and admired and frees us for Christ, who leads us on the road of service.

"This experience of God's acceptance frees us from our needy self and thus creates new space

where we can pay selfless attention to others. This new freedom in Christ allows us to move in the world uninhibited by our compulsions and to act creatively even when we are laughed at and rejected, even when our words and actions lead us to death."

Nouwen wants us to ignore the lure of upward mobility and the temptations to be relevant, to be spectacular, and to be powerful. Instead, the Gospel presents a goal of a self-emptied heart and the

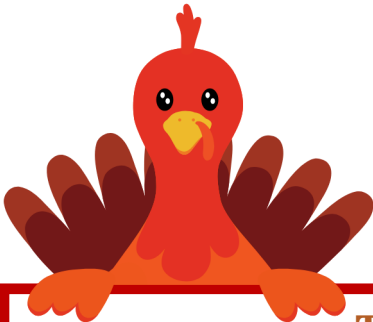

It's been a busy early fall season as we work through our yearly inspections and continue to improve the property.

We appreciate everyone's patience over the past few months as we have addressed issues with our outdated, unsupported access control system. Unfortunately, we were caught off-guard with the timing and things took longer than expected to be addressed. Thanks to Cindy and Brandi for helping to work with Regional Fire and others during this process!

Since my last Clopper property update, we continue to try to finish the roof and gutter work after the weeks of rain forced us to hold off. The work with Happy Home Roofing will be completed during the last week of October. Thanks to Katie Deatrach for her work to secure grant funding that will cover 50% of the costs! The interior upgrades are in a holding pattern until we receive quotes to address the electrical and plumbing issues and decide how to tactfully restore these utilities. Recently, the dehumidification unit in the basement has been replaced and the work performed by the Youth looks great!

To support the CLC and their needs, we are working to install a new fence between the new playground equipment and stormwater pond. Inside the building, a washer and dryer will be installed in the mechanical space. We are

## MISSION MOUSE

This month is the month to think about giving. There have been so many needs expressed for hurricane relief. Our first request comes from our United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) for short. When you give to a need with UMCOR every bit of your donation goes to support the mission that you are giving to. Many of the other agencies that ask for donations go to the administration of the mission. To give to UMCOR make a check payable to Mt. Nebo UMC and put hurricane relief and a check will be made out and sent to UMCOR. If you want to give cash, put the cash in one of the special offering envelopes and put it in the offering plate on Sunday morning, or take it to the Mt. Nebo office. Please mark the envelope with your name and write hurricane relief on the envelope.



You have all heard of Samaritan's Purse. What I think of is packing a shoebox when I hear that name, but they are wonderful at hurricane relief programs too. At present, they are working in North Carolina as well as Florida and other areas that have been affected by the latest hurricanes. They are there organizing people who volunteer for the day or who come to volunteer for longer periods. They do an amazing job. This all takes money and they accept donations also. You can mark your donation to be given totally for the project you have in mind, or you can give part of your donation for administration work. ## COMMUNITY CHRISTMAS OUTREACH

Christmas Outreach is a wonderful program started by community church members many years ago. It was created to provide families in the South Washington County area in need with winter clothing and gifts for the children. There are usually 15-20 families with close to 50 children divided amongst some local churches with Mt Nebo taking five or more families. The families remain anonymous and are listed as *Family 1, Boy 9, etc.* These lists will be up in the Gathering area by the first week of November.

You may participate in this ministry by choosing a child and signing up for needed items you would like to purchase for them. Once purchased and wrapped please label them with a post-it note that states the family # and child with age. Example: Family 2, Girl 7. Please have all gifts to the church by **Sunday, December 8<sup>th</sup>**.

We also have a Christmas Outreach account for donations. If you can't or do not like to shop the crowded stores, you may participate in this way. The money is used to purchase items that are not signed up for, usually the coats or boots, etc. We can accept cash in the Christmas Outreach envelopes in the pews, or by writing a check to the church and marking Christmas Outreach in the memo line at the bottom of the check.

**Thursday, December 12<sup>th</sup>**, will be a fun day of wrapping and labelling each gift and bagging them for pick-up or delivery. We will start at 9am and only ask you to bring scissors.

## TRI STATE HOPE BUILDERS—VIM

We served in Hindman, Kentucky this year. This town and the surrounding counties experienced two one hundred-year floods in two weeks. Forty-four people lost their lives with 22 of them in the Hindman area.

We served from September 28<sup>th</sup> to October 11<sup>th</sup>. The schedule was very flexible as we had 28 in the first week and 18 the second.

New construction was what we worked on exclusively. In every case, these new homes were built on higher ground. I don't think any of the homeowners had flood insurance as they were not living in a flood plain. These homes replaced much older homes and because of their age, the insurance coverage was on an actual cash value basis and not replacement cost. More than likely the homeowner only received about 60% of what the replacement cost would have been.

We worked with ASP (Appalachian Service Project). They are well funded and whatever we needed we received it in a timely manner. They provide these homes with a \$120,000 mortgage. Every year for 5 years \$20,000 of the mortgage is eliminated until the home is free and clear. For this to work the homeowner must live there for 5 years, it cannot be rented, no interior walls can be moved or modified, and they can't sell the home. After 5 years it is the homeowners free and clear, and they can do what they want with the home. Every family we met told us of their experience the morning of the flood. It began at 1 AM with no warning and there are many incidents of heroism and tragedy they shared with us. We have no idea about the damage and the horror these people experienced.

We worked on two homes in Sassafras, KY. One home had the exterior walls up and by the end of our time, the roof and siding were finished, the interior walls were up and the sheet rock was hung and finished and the plumbing and electrical were nearing completion. We worked with the contractors and in some cases side by side.

The second home in Sassafras was within a few hours of completion when we left on the last day. We built a set of steps, hung kitchen cabinets, hung all the doors, painted the walls and installed the quarter round. The only thing we didn't finish was the installation and painting of the baseboard. We were so close, but it was not to be. I'm sure they were in within a few days.

The home in Whitesburg was in move-in condition after we were done. We insulated the floor working from the crawl space, completed the painting and repaired a couple of doors that were unable to shut. We installed the handrails on the ramps and seeded the lawn.

In Neon, KY we painted the exterior of the foundation and did the same thing in Hazard.

In Wayland the team installed a much-needed ramp.

One of the reasons we were unable to finish the home in Sassafras is because we stopped

working about noon on the last Friday we were there. We always take the time for the whole team to go to each of the homes and pray with the owners and bless the home. This has always been one of the highlights of the mission as we pray for good health and protection for the homeowners and the home.

This trip was one of the best ones I have experienced in the last 30 years. We stayed at the Hindman Methodist Church. Jan, my contact who helped with the arrangements, could not have been more helpful. She is married to a doctor, and he was very helpful with keeping our team in good health with prescription needs and health supplies. The second Sunday their drummer was not able to attend church, so Jeff Palm played the drums with them. This church is alive and well. Already they are helping with the recovery from Hurricane Helene sending the victims a pickup truck full of flood buckets and other items they will need.

Thank you for your support. We know the thoughts and prayers and the financial support are extremely important to the success of our mission and for God's glory. The planned date for next year's VIM Trip will be **9/29/25 to 10/10/25**.
