As we near the forty days of preparation during the Lenten Season, I wanted to share a reflection that I wrote while in seminary, which was later posted in a Beacon Newsletter article in 2019, about my journey of preparation and how it has changed my life forever:

In July of 2007, while finalizing the month-end closing at my office in Baltimore, I was struck with a very odd feeling that I had never experienced before in my life. I was sitting alone. The only one

in the office over a long Fourth of July holiday weekend. Isolated from friends and family, focused only on being able to close the books. We were already a couple of years into a declining real estate market. Each month the outlook seemed bleaker. I realized that I could no longer go forward in the way that I had been living my life. I was physically, mentally, and spiritually exhausted. As Marjorie Thompson put it so well in her book *Soul Feast*, "There is a hunger

abroad in our times, haunting lives and hearts. Like an empty stomach aching beneath the sleek coat of a seemingly well-fed creature, it reveals that something is missing from the diet of our rational secular and affluent culture." I had sacrificed years, building several successful careers, and I now was on the brink of ruin. I had ignored my family and friends, and most importantly, I had ignored my faith in God. For me this was an epiphany. At that moment, I resolved to make changes in my life that would lead me back to God – the source of spirituality.

It was at this time that I applied to seminary. During the application process, I was asked if this was a good time for me to start such a journey given all that was going on in my life. I was asked



again by my academic advisor when I applied to become a student pastor – she too questioned the timing. I understood all their concerns, but I had a calling that I was not going to ignore. I held fast to the scriptural precedence for Christians to follow their calling even when it did not seem to be a good time. I was reminded of Matthew 8:22 where a follower of Christ wanted to go home to his father to live and take care of his affairs until he passed. Jesus responded to him by saying that he

> should focus on his calling. A better sense of Jesus' statement would be, don't neglect the high spiritual calling I've given you; let the spiritually dead attend to the routine tasks of life.

> Even though I ignored the concerns of so many, I did have concerns about my own fitness to serve. Deep down, I felt that I was too broken spiritually to be able to serve. Although I had come a long way in a short period, this thought haunted me. Through dialogue in my discipleship group at Wesley, I was able

to begin to reconcile those destructive thoughts. I finally began to realize that the past, no matter how ugly it may have been, needs to be gathered up into a new kind of ministry. One where the past is honored, and not denigrated. In this new kind of ministry, we become wounded healers. I was finally able to allow the past to rest.

When I began this journey, I was not familiar with the term spiritual formation. I was starting from square one. All I knew was that I felt so wretched and disconnected from God. Thompson explained that this feeling of being too small and insignificant for God to bother with, or feeling that God could not love me as I really was, was a normal reaction at the beginning of the journey. At the same time, I also felt the hunger for God,

divinely implanted in my heart. I was determined to become closer to God and I looked forward with hope as I embarked on this journey.

One of the first steps on this journey of transformation was to begin to practice a disciplined spiritual life rooted in daily prayer and devotion. I began to pray throughout the day. Since I was in real estate, I would spend a great deal of time in the solitude of a car or my office. This gave me the opportunity to pray and reflect on my life and to listen for direction from God. I found a reaffirmation of this in the writings of Dietrich Bonhoeffer where he stated that, "Alone you stood before God when he called you; alone you had to answer that call; alone you had to struggle and pray, and alone vou will die and give account to God." I found out that opening ourselves to the work of the Spirit requires effort and discipline. New spiritual practices were required that would open my heart to the limitless possibilities of my new calling.

In July 2013, almost six years ago to the day of my epiphany, I started a part time appointment at a small United Methodist Church. Because of my work with the homeless in urban areas. I was expecting this first appointment to have a backdrop of sirens and flashing lights. It turned out to be a rural farming community. From this experience, I have come to accept the will of God and to accept the guidance of the Holy Spirit wherever it leads me. This letting-go and listening to that inner dialogue with God has allowed me to focus on my calling even when I am in environments where I am constantly bombarded with the noise and distractions of the outside world. As Thompson stated, "Listening is the first expression in communicating in prayer...Yet God desires to be known and has many ways of communicating with us if we are willing to listen."

On this incredible journey, I have often looked to the writings of Dietrich Bonhoeffer for inspiration. At the end of his life, Bonhoeffer was a prisoner, knowing that at any moment he could be executed. Even until the very end he maintained his faith and Christian hope. I can identify with his

struggle in the way I had been living – never knowing what the next day may hold. I was only able to continue by faith and hope.

This journey back to God has given me new life. I look forward to a new tomorrow and a new me. I have faith and hope, and I am content with where I am in my life and where God is directing me!

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


MISSIONS IN OUTREACH
